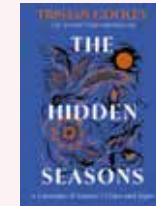

Tristan Gooley shows how to read the clues that nature gives us - but that we continually miss, because we don't know how and where to look. Spring is the time of wildflower signs, unique cloud shapes and curious animal behaviour. Summer is a time of coastal clues, astronomical extremes and secret grass patterns. Autumn is a time for reading leaves, deciphering scents and investigating fungi. In winter, we learn to read snow, deepen our star knowledge and find clues in overlooked places, including indoors. The author of *How to Read Water* and *How to Read a Tree*, inspires us to explore the signs for ourselves, giving us many rich insights into our turning year.

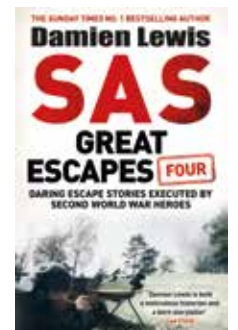


DAMIEN LEWIS: SAS GREAT ESCAPES

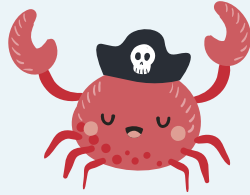

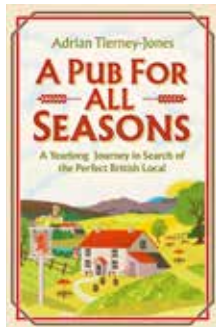


ADRIAN TIERNEY-JONES: A PUB FOR ALL SEASONS – IN SEARCH OF THE PERFECT BRITISH LOCAL

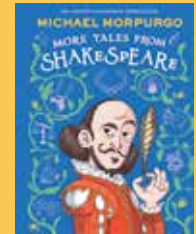
MICHAEL MORPURGO: SPRING – THE STORY OF A SEASON In Conversation

MS OLDENBURG – THE FERRY TO LUNDY

The award recognises exceptional dedication to preserving maritime heritage, specifically for saving SS Freshspring.



KEITH DENBY: THE SOUTH AUSTRALIAN

The clipper *South Australian* was built in Sunderland in 1868. For nearly two decades she voyaged annually between London and South Australia, but on 14 February 1889 she was lost off the shores of Lundy. In 1986 members of the Ilfracombe & North Devon Sub-Aqua Club found and identified the wreck, now a Scheduled Ancient Monument. Diver **Keith Denby** tells the story of this historic discovery.

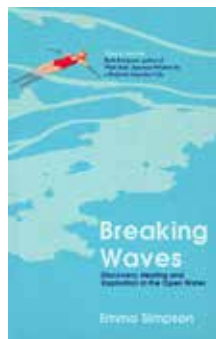

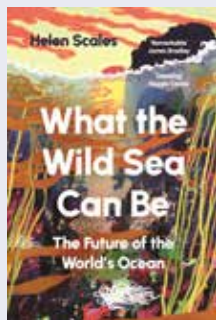

The Stuart regime rapidly descended into turbulence and less than 50 years later it culminated in the destruction of the monarchy in the English Civil War.
